SHERIFF GOLDEN SPEAKS TO NEWS 12 AS AUTO THEFTS AND HOME INVASIONS CONTINUE



Sheriff Golden spoke to News 12 New Jersey Reporter Jim Murdoch on March 20 about the ongoing crisis of auto thefts in Monmouth County that have led to home invasions. According to the latest statistics from the Monmouth County Prosecutor's Office for 2024, there have been 27 high end vehicles thefts and 18 of those thefts were accompanied with entry into a home. The sheriff continues to stress that this is not a policing problem but a policy one which needs to change, beginning with bail reform.



MCSO ISSUES SCAM ALERT

The MCSO issued a warning against a telephone scam in March after residents reported that callers were stating they were from the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office, advising people that they failed to report to jury duty and were texting them links on their phones to pay the imposed fines.

Please be advised that NO sheriff's officer from the MCSO will call to inform individuals for failure to appear nor will they ever ask for money or claim that an arrest

warrant has been issued.

Complaints to the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office can be directed to (732) 431-6400. In regard to any SCAM, always use your best judgement. If it doesn't seem right, it's probably not.

OEM WELCOMES NEW CERT MEMBERS

The MCSO welcomed 18 new Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) members who began basic training in March.

This is the second group of volunteers participating to assist their communities in the event of a disaster or emergency. CERT members receive more than 20 hours of training in basic disaster response skills, including fire safety, search and rescue, first aid, and disaster medical operations.

During the first session, CERT members worked on team building and were presented with an introduction into disaster awareness.

The MCSO OEM CERT was established in 2023 and has 53 active members who continue to meet and train monthly.



REGISTER READY

The Register Ready program was presented to residents at the Ocean Township Senior Center on March 21. Register Ready is a partnership between the Department of Aging and MCSO/OEM. It allows residents with disabilities, or access and functional needs and their families, friends and caregivers, an opportunity to provide information to emergency response agencies so emergency responders can better plan to serve them in a disaster or other emergency. Registrants were also provided with a Ready Go Bag to utilize during a disaster.

MCSO OEM is a statewide leader in Register Ready with more participants than any other county in NJ.
